2000-2001 GSN FIELD TRIP GRANTS

D.D. LaPointe, GSN Educational Committee Co-Chair

In November, members of the GSN Education Committee reviewed and evaluated more than 80 applications for GSN Earth Science Field Trip Grants totaling more than \$14,000. Of these, 73 were selected for partial funding using a budget of \$5000 allocated from the GSN Foundation plus a \$250 donation from WAAIME earmarked for 2000-2001 field trips. Because of the tremendous response to the program, we were able to fund only 38% to 50% of each request, hoping that the schools will be able to make up the difference to go on their proposed Earth science field trips.

The requests came from schools in Washoe, Clark, Churchill, Douglas, Lyon, Carson, Lincoln, Mineral, Nye, White Pine, and Humboldt Counties, and included 18 requests from "at risk" schools. The grants will help defray transportation costs for more than 4500 students to participate in Earth science-related field trips in the 2000-2001 school year. The school field trips proposed for funding include visits to the Hazen diatomite mine, Berlin-Ichthyosaur Park, Bodie, Kennecott-Rawhide Mine, Coeur-Rochester mine, Mono Lake, Yosemite, Pyramid Lake, Gerlach area, Lunar Crater, Virginia City, UNR Seismology Lab, Planetarium, and Keck Museum, Grover Hot Springs, Grimes Point, Lone Tree Mine, Great Basin Park, Crystal Peak, Adams Gypsum Mine, Steamboat geothermal plant, Valley of Fire, Granite Construction aggregate pit, and others.

Thanks to all who have supported the GSN Foundation fundraisers that provided the money to make these field experiences a reality for so many Nevada students.

COPPER IN NEVADA?

Nicole Preuss, Senior Geologist, Equatorial Tonopah Mining Ltd

The Tonopah Copper deposit is located in the northern San Antonio Mountains of Nye County, Nevada. Copper is not the first mineral to have been mined from the area. In the past, silver and molybdenum were also mined. Liberty Springs was the site of the first mining in the area where sporadic silver mining occurred from 1876 to around 1900. Approximately 100,000 ounces of silver was mined during that period.

Clarence Hall developed an underground silver mine in what later became know as the Hall deposit. During World War II the U.S. Bureau of Mines identified the Hall deposit as a molybdenum resource, and in the late 1940s U.S. Vanadium purchased the deposit. In the mid-1960s the Anaconda Company procured the deposit and began developing the molybdenum orebody. Production started in 1979 and lasting through 1985. Subsequently the property was sold to Cyprus Metals who reopened the mine in 1986 and operated it through 1991. Most recently, Equatorial Mining purchased the copper portion of the deposit in mid-1997. The first copper was produced in early 2000.

There have been multiple intrusive events in the history of the Tonopah Copper deposit, the most important event being the composite intrusion of the Hall stock, 77 + 2 Ma. The stock created a proximal molybdenum/distal copper deposit that subsequently underwent extensional and rotational faulting. The copper enrichment occurred during supergene processes with the deposition of chalcocite below the paleo-water table. Extensive weathering and Basin and Range style faulting followed supergene enrichment. Potassic and argillic alteration are the dominant types of alteration found in the deposit.

Geologic modeling of the deposit has shown the resource to be 132 million tons at 0.31% total copper and the reserve to be 104 million tons at 0.34% total copper (year-end 1999). The overall stripping ratio is 0.7 to 1 with mining being done in 30 foot benches. Mining operations are done by a contract miner using hydraulic shovels and 150 ton haul trucks. The total current work force at the mine is approximately 180 people.

Processing begins with ore being crushed in a two stage system to 90% passing 1.5 inch screens. The crushed ore is then stacked on the leach pad in 20 foot lifts with concentrated sulfuric acid used as the primary leaching agent. Copper recovery is done in a three-stage, solution extraction/electrowinning plant. Currently, the mine is still in the ramping up phase with current production of 40,000 lbs of copper per day. Full production is targeted for September 2001 at which time the plant is scheduled to produce 150,000 lbs of copper per day at 99.999% pure.




