SO WHAT IF THE WITWATERSRAND BASIN ISN'T A DETRITAL GOLD DEPOSIT? EXPLORATION IMPLICATIONS AND LINKS TO OTHER HYDROTHERMAL SYSTEMS

Nick Fox, Chief Geologist, AngloGold Ltd, South Africa

AngloGold Ltd is the world's largest gold producer, with much of its production coming from the enormously well endowed Witwatersrand Basin. Other operations include Cripple Creek in Colorado, Jerritt Canyon (70%) in Nevada, Cuiaba, Morro Vehlo, and Serra Grande (50%) in Brazil. Serra Vanguardia in Argentina, Sadiola (50%), Yatela (50%), and Morila (50%) in Mali, Geita (50%) in Tanzania, Navachab in Namibia and Sunrise Dam, Boddington (34.4%), Tanami (50%) and Union Reefs in Australia.


The Witwatersrand is part of a relatively undeformed, late Archaean 'greenstone' belt, and probably owes many of its characteristics to deposition on thick, stable continental crust. The majority of the micro- to macroscopic characteristics support the concentration of gold within the mineralized units by purely hydrothermal means. If this is accepted, what fluids are implicated, and what geodynamic setting could have favored the creation of such an unusually extensive and continuous gold system?

This talk reviews some of the evidence for a hydrothermal origin within the generic framework of the development of a geological model for these gold deposits using the Vaal River ore body as an example. The discussion then considers some implications for hydrothermal systems in other, perhaps related, metal systems, and for other epochs.


David W. Blake

(1937-2000)

David Blake passed away unexpectedly on 13th September, 2000 at his home after a long, hot day of fieldwork south of Battle Mountain, Nevada. His close friends were shocked and saddened to hear that Dave was gone at the young age of 63, after an active career of field geology that began in the mid-1960s. Dave received his Bachelor's Degree from Oregon State in 1962 and completed a Master's Degree from the University of Arizona in 1967. His long career in private industry began in 1967 as a staff geologist for the Duval Corporation (later Battle Mountain Gold) in Battle Mountain, Nevada. He was responsible for the geology of the operating mines and initiating new exploration programs. In recent years he worked as a consultant to several major and junior mining and exploration companies.

At Duval, he assembled a very good geologic staff and they applied very innovative programs that employed up-to-date methods in geochemistry, structural geology, and hydrothermal alteration studies to document known mineralization and to explore new areas in the district. When Duval's management decided they wanted a gold deposit, his team responded with the discovery of the Tomboy-Minnie deposit and subsequently with the world-class Fortitude deposit. Dave was a true student of geology and ore deposits and a well-read explorationist who never lost his love for fieldwork and working out complex geologic problems. This interest lead to a collaborative research association with Ted Theodore (USGS) that resulted in a series of Professional Papers and other published papers detailing the geology and geochemistry of major ore deposits in the Battle Mountain mining district. The exploration community has lost one of its distinguished members who made a significant contribution to the science of economic geology in Nevada and he will surely be missed.
